Police Graduates win top posts

Two graduates of Chisholm's Police Studies course have been promoted to high ranking positions in the Victorian Police force following a reorganisation of their senior management team.

Mr Brendan Crimmins (44) was promoted to Assistant Commissioner (Personnel and Training) and Mr Carl Mengler (51) was promoted to Assistant Commissioner (Internal Investigations). Their promotions follow the announcement of the impending retirement of Chief Commissioner Mick Miller.

Both men studied for the Associate Diploma in Police Studies at Chisholm 10 years ago and were among the foundation group of students.

Former Police Studies course leader, Mr Jim Reilly, commented that both men even then showed outstanding potential. 'It came as no surprise to me

Both were highly motivated to further their qualifications and at the time Chisholm's was the only Police Studies course available. 'You tend to become too insular in the Police force,' said Mr Mengler. 'Courses like this really broaden the mind'.

Mr Reilly commented that the traditional areas of study pursued by police officers has changed over the years. police are now encouraged to study in other relevant areas, not just law.

Management study identifies training needs

Management lecturer, Leah Spatz, recently completed a study identifying the training needs of middle managers and supervisors.

With David Syme Business School collegues Joan McPhee, on secondment to the Metal Trades Industry Association, and June Gleeson, on secondment to the Western Institute, Ms Spatz's study looks at managers needs in relation to employee participation in productivity improvement and occupational health and safety programs in the metal and engineering industry.

The study surveyed 47 firms who had said in a 1984 Metal Trades Industry Association study, that they operated employee participation schemes.

The study concluded that middle managers and supervisors needed a clear understanding of company goals and objectives; knowledge of participative management skills; interactive skills; and the ability to delegate authority and accept responsibility of decision-making.

It found that effective training needs to be practical, ongoing and company specific.

The project was funded by the Department of Industrial Relations under the employee participation research grants scheme.

Copies of the study are available from Leah Spatz, extn. 2057. The paper should soon be published as a monograph by the Federal Government.

Merger Rumours Cause Rethink

The Director, Dr Vaughan, has asked staff for their views on future directions for Chisholm, in the light of rumours that major mergers may occur between tertiary institutions.

Following advice from the Chairman of VPSEC, Dr Cullen, that he would like to see six institutions coordinating tertiary education in Victoria, and that a discussion paper would include

the concept of a University of Technology formed by amalgamating Chisholm and Swinburne, Dr Vaughan said that he would like to consider all options for Chisholm.

He said that we should consider partnerships with other institutions if there are advantages in so doing. Staff wishing to comment should pass their views through their Deans or Associate Directors before Christmas to enable a paper to be prepared for Council.

Caroline Chisholm Academic and General Staff Awards presented

The Caroline Chisholm Staff Awards were presented to eight Institute staff recently.

The Awards are the result of Council moves to acknowledge and encourage outstanding contributions to the work of Chisholm, and were made to both academic and general staff.

The Academic Staff Awards went to Dr Brian Costar, a lecturer in the Politics Department; Dr Charles Don, a senior lecturer in the Division of Mathematical and Environmental Sciences who joined Chisholm in July 1976, and gained his doctorate from Monash University in 1972; Mrs Pearl Levin, a senior lecturer in the Division of Information Technology; and Mr Paul Voumard, a senior lecturer in the Division of Engineering and Industrial Technology.

The General Staff Awards were made toMs Joan Ciastkowski, the Executive Officer to the Director of Chisholm, currently under contract to the Centre for the Development of Entrepreneurs; Ms Sue Phillips, the School Administrative Officer of the

School of Education; Mr Paul Rodan, the Academic Secretary of the Institute, currently under contract as a lecturer in the School of Social and Behavioural Studies; and Ms Eileen Wilson, the Assistant Staff Officer of the Institute.



Caroline Chisholm was an early 'Feminist' says historian

Caroline Chisholm was the forerunner of the tradition of Australian women's political activism, said Dr Patricia Grimshaw in giving the inaugural Caroline Chisholm Oration at Chisholm's new multi-purpose hall on 26 November.

Dr Grimshaw is a Senior Lecturer in History at the University of Melbourne, and is a noted historian whose expertise focuses on Australian society and women. She went on to say that Caroline Chisholm devoted herself to improving the lot of women, a goal which, given the world as she found it, she achieved.

Dr Grimshaw's talk covered Caroline Chisholm's life and activities in the New South Wales of the early nineteenth century and in England at the end of her life. She analysed the attention given to Mrs Chisholm by historians, concluding that Mrs Chisholm's interests coincided with those of modern historians: immigration of the "right sort" of people to Australia, etc., and that she provides mainstream historians with the opportunity to cover the life of one woman within the estab-



lished, male, patterns. However the same attention has not been given to later female political activists.

Dr Grimshaw concluded that Mrs Chisholm was not a conservative but a reformer, despite her similarity of views to modern conservatives. In 1853, Punch called her 'a second Moses in a bonnet and a shawl'. Dr Grimshaw said Caroline Chisholm was a redoubtable woman, whose gifts for practical, pragmatic initiatives achieved much for women in her time.

Dr Grimshaw is the author of a number of historical and general works, including Women's Suffrage in New Zealand, and coedited The Half Open Door, Australian Women - Feminist Perspectives, and Families in Colonial Australia. She has taught women's history within the area of American history and women's history at the University for the past nine years. Dr Grimshaw is also active in women's issues at the University and elsewhere. She addressed Chisholm staff earlier this year on feminist history in Australia.

Chisholm's Solar Cat places sixth in Solar Challenge race

The only entry in the Pentax World Solar Challenge race from Darwin to Adelaide from Melbourne, Chisholm's Solar Cat placed sixth, closely behind the Darwin Institute vehicle, which won line honours in the educational category.


Ahead of them were the GM Sunraycer, reputed to have cost \$US5 million, the Ford Australia entry, the Biel entry from Switzerland and the Dick Smith entry. Australian vehicles took four of the six top places in a field of 23. At the time of publication, several vehicles were still on route, and nine had dropped out of the race.

The Solar Vehicle project used the talents of staff and students to design and build a radically different vehicle. More than 50 Mechanical, Electrical and Industrial Engineering students were involved in this project over the last two years. In addition, a number of other departments at the Institute contributed, including Graphic Design, Chemistry and Psychology.

The project presented a challenge to produce an unusual and efficient vehicle and at the same time exposed students to real world engineering exercises. Mechanical and Electrical students were mainly involved in research and development, designing to criteria of performance, reliability, safety and aesthetics and they constructed a vehicle which was competitive against the best in the world. The Industrial Engineering students contributed to project organisation, crew and driver training, publicity and sponsorship.

Fire in the Truck

On the return trip from Adelaide, a battery fell against a petrol tin,

and there was a fire in the truck, which was not discovered until it was opened in Melbourne. Team Leader Paul Wellington of Mechanical Engineering said that he thought there was insufficient air in the truck to sustain the fire, and that this had saved the vehicle. Even so, there was some scorching of the tail section.

A Catamaran without Sails

Chisholm's entry looked to its designers like a catamaran without the sails and was thus dubbed the 'Desert Cat'. The catamaran design was developed to give


both low aerodynamic drag and good aerodynamic stability. The winds from passing vehicles could easily lift a solar panel and cause the vehicle to overturn. To overcome this, an asymmetric body design with the body on the right hand edge of the panel was chosen. The full scale catamaran design was then developed, using wind tunnel modelling in Chisholm and RMIT's tunnels. The optimum design required the body under the solar panel to have straight, vertical sides, which was perfect for the body material selected - a fibreglass

faced aluminium honeycomb composite panel donated by Ciba Geigy. This gave excellent strength and stiffness while keeping the weight down.

The catamaran design offered Chisholm the possibility of covering not only the top panel but also the sides of the vehicle with cells. Hoxan, a Japanese manufacturer of solar cells donated \$30,000 worth of cells to the team. This design ensured a comparatively even power input over the day with the side cells providing a high percentage of the total power early morning and late afternoon.

Other major sponsors included the Victorian Solar Energy Commission who donated \$15,000, Earth Computer Systems, who donated a \$10,000 Australian-made computer, and the Greater Shepparton Development Council, who arranged to transport the vehicle to Darwin

and back from Adelaide. There were a number of minor sponsors as well.




ARGS grants

Wood scanning seminar applauded

Dr John Davis, Senior Lecturer in the Department of Applied Physics was congratulated in the November issue of Wood Science Digest for an excellent presentation on wood scanning at the CSIRO recently.

Dr Davis spoke at a seminar on 'Scanning of Wood using Computerised Tomography – Potential for the Timber Industry' jointly sponsored by the Australian Branch of the Institute of Wood Science and the JW Gottstein Memorial Trust. The seminar was attended by some 70 personnel, half from the timber industry and half from scientific research establishments.

Dr Davis directed his talk towards the practical application of the Computerised Tomography technique rather than its theorectical background which resulted in a great amount of interest from the timber industry.

'Friends of Rao' award


