MISS ALICE HOY

Miss Alice Hoy a member of the University Council was awarded, at the recent A.N.Z.A.A.S. Congress, the Mackie Medal for distinguished service to science. Miss Hoy is the first woman to be awarded this medal.

DR. J.A.L. MATHESON

The Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Matheson, has been appointed Chairman of the A.V.C.C. for two years from November 1966. Dr. Matheson has also been appointed Chairman of the Council of the Institute of Higher Technical Education of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea.

FIRST WOMAN PROFESSOR OF LAW

Dr. Enid Campbell has been appointed to the Sir Isaac Isaacs Chair of Law.

Dr. Campbell, who is Associate Professor of Law at the University of Sydney, will be the first woman to hold a Chair of Law in an Australasian University.

She will be the second woman to hold a chair at Monash as Professor Maureen Brunt occupies a Chair of Economics.

At present Professor Campbell is at the Law School of the University of Wisconsin as a Visiting Fellow. Dr. Campbell is a graduate of the University of Tasmania in Law and Economics, and in 1959 she obtained her Ph.D. from Duke University, U.S.A. The topic of her thesis was "John Austin and Jurisprudence in Nineteenth Century England."

Her main interest is public law and her work in this area has been focussed on constitutional history, parliamentary law and practice, legislation, judicial administration, civil liberties, criminal law and procedure, and public land law.

In addition to many contributions to legal literature Professor Campbell has recently published two books: "Parliamentary Privilege in Australia" Melbourne University Press 1966, and "Freedom in Australia" (with Harry Whitmore) Sydney University Press 1966.

Professor Campbell is expected to take up her appointment after the middle of this year.

NEW CHAIR OF EDUCATION

Dr. Peter Fensham has been appointed to a chair of education. He will be specially concerned with the methods of teaching science in schools and universities, the education of science teachers, and the improvement of the curriculum in the science subjects taught in schools.

Dr. Fensham, who is at present Reader in Physical Chemistry in the University of Melbourne, has had experience in both the physical and the social sciences. He holds a Ph.D. of Bristol University in physical chemistry and a Ph.D. of Cambridge University in social psychology. Dr. Fensham has had a distinguished career in chemistry, graduating Bachelor of Science in 1948, and Master of Science with first class honours and the Dixon Research Scholarship in Chemistry from the University of Melbourne in 1950. In 1953 he was admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Bristol University for his work on "magnetochemical studies of oxides" and later carried out some post-doctoral research at Princeton University.

From 1953 to 1956 Dr. Fensham was Nuffield Sociological Scholar at Kings College University of Cambridge. This imaginative award by the Nuffield Foundation enabled him to obtain training and do research in social psychology. In 1956 he was admitted to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in the University of Cambridge for his work on the psychological and sociological consequences for all levels of management and labour of technological change in two Essex weaving companies which were switching to more automatic methods of production.

For the past ten years Dr. Fensham has been on the staff of the Department of Chemistry at Melbourne University and has had a wide variety of experience in teaching at tertiary level. In 1963 and 1964 he visited a number of overseas universities.

Dr. Fensham has been involved in several special tutorial experiments and has published work on these and the objectives of teaching and examining.

His interest in the social sciences has been maintained by co-supervising a field study of leisure attitudes and behaviour in a Melbourne suburb (1957-61) and by investigating the distribution of Commonwealth Scholarships in Victoria between different types of schools (1965).

Dr. Fensham who is married with four children is expected to take up his new appointment in September. His appointment complements that of Professor S.S. Dunn, who took up duty last year, and whose special interests lie in the fields of measurement and experimental education.

CHAIR OF PHILOSOPHY

Dr. A.C. Jackson has accepted the invitation of the University Council to occupy a Chair in Philosophy. This is the second Chair of Philosophy in the University, the first is held by Professor D.H. Monro.

Dr. Jackson, who was previously Reader in Philosophy in the University of Melbourne, is married with four children. He took up his new appointment early in 1967.

He obtained the degree of Master of Arts with first class honours from the University of Melbourne in 1942. In 1946 and 1947 Dr. Jackson attended Professor Wittgenstein's classes in Cambridge and was supervised by Professor Wisdom. He was awarded the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in the University of Cambridge in 1953.

In 1958 the University of Oxford invited him to be the John Locke Lecturer and more recently he has taught general philosophy and moral philosophy at University College, Oxford.

CHAIR OF PHILOSOPHY (cont.)

Dr. Jackson's particular interest is in the philosophy of mind, and a good deal of his time in the University of Melbourne has been spent in teaching post-graduate students at the Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy levels.

David Crosher writes of the Play:

'The Three Sisters' was first produced under Stanislavsky in Moscow in 1901. In the same year Chekhov began work on his last play, 'The Cherry Orchard'. Within a simple framework - the story of how three sisters, confined in a stifling provincial environment, desire to return to Moscow where they believe they can attain happiness - Chekhov explores many of his favourite themes - social displacement, incommunication between human beings, the atrophying effects of environment, frustrated love. The play has been interpreted both as a comedy and as a tragedy. We can perhaps take a cue for understanding the play from Vershinin's remark: 'We're not happy, and we can't be happy: We only want happiness.'

ALEXANDER THEATRE

HELP W.U.S. CATCH A BUS

Student Travel Service (operated by Wilshire James Travel Pty. Ltd. on behalf of the National Union of Australian University Students) offers to graduates and undergraduates the chance to travel to London for only \$370. In conjunction with the British organization, The Association of World Learning, Student Travel Service is arranging travel by charter flight from Singapore to London for \$225. Travel to Singapore by ship is arranged for \$145 or alternatively, a regular air service can be used.

STAFF-STUDENT CONFERENCE - 1967

RELIGIOUS CENTRE

The Religious Centre had its beginnings in the thought of a group of representatives of the Anglican, Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic churches who in January 1959, less than six months after the Interim Council's first meeting, made approach to the Council suggesting the establishment of a united Christian Centre in the University. The Council at once set up a sub-committee which, after discussions with the churches, reported that in its view "the University has a duty to make provision for the spiritual needs of its students and that, at this stage of its development, it has an opportunity to integrate and centralize such provision in a way quite novel in Australia". In its recommendation to the Council, the committee proposed not only facilities for Christian worship and activities but also a meeting place which could be used by members of other religious faiths.

With the arrival of the first students in 1961, Anglican and Roman Catholic chaplains were appointed by the churches - the Anglican chaplain having pastoral responsibility for all protestant students - and in 1962 the Hillel Foundation appointed a chaplain to Jewish students. Office accommodation was made available for the chaplains and from the beginning of 1962 the "Red Cross Cottage" - a survivor from the time when the Talbot Epileptic Colony occupied the site - was made available as a temporary religious centre.

In 1965, with the approval of the Council, the churches launched an appeal for funds, and when the success of the appeal seemed reasonably assured Messrs. Mockridge, Stahle and Mitchell were appointed Architects for the Centre which is now being built on a site made available by the Council between the Administration and Union buildings. When completed the building will be given by the churches to the University; it is expected to be ready by the beginning of the 1968 academic year.

On Thursday, 16th March 1967, the Churches Appeal Committee arranged a small informal ceremony at which the Premier, Sir Henry Bolte, placed the central surveying peg. In announcing a contribution to the project by the Government Sir Henry said,-

It gives me great honour to do this and may I say that I am thrilled to have the honour because I believe this is one of the greatest concepts of all time. The principle behind it is so wonderful and the need is so urgent that it would be intolerable almost if we did not raise sufficient money to go ahead with this project. The Government thinks so greatly of it that we are prepared to put in \$20,000.

The Churches Appeal Committee has also arranged for His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, Sir Rohan Delacombe, to lay the foundation stone of the Centre on Sunday, 9th April at a ceremony to be attended by representatives of all churches and of the University.
