

- Q. Concerning the students...

- Q. Do you think it is difficult for 1st years to adapt to College life?
- A. It is my opinion that far too many students expect teetiary institutions to be the same as secondary ones. That is, you listen carefully to what lecturers are saving, write it down, and this then is education - just regurgitating what they say in examinations. I believe good lecturing involves challenging the students and asking them to go to resource material, to argue and discuss, and then determine their own point of view, in light of the material found. In other words, the important aspect of tertiary work is the effoet the student puts in. in his own time. For too many students work too hard because they can't discriminate material ... they must be able to sift their material, predict exam questions, budget their time and consolidate their opinions. Again, in regard to high standards, I believe that the students themselves expect high standards you get no satisfaction in passing a subject that you yourself have gained nothing from. There are alot of personal rewards from independent research.
- Q. There are alot of social issues at the moment in tertiary institutions. Can you see a place for them at Frankston?
- A. It is my view that in Colleges we should expect work from our students as high in standard as Universities, but the type of work being done in College differs somewhat from Universities. We know that the teachers we are training have got to handle people it is therefore essential that they know a great deal about themselves as people, the way they behave and children's behaviour, as well as all the forces within the community which make people behave as they do. I would therefore consider that courses oriented to giving students this understanding are very important.

I've found little difference in Colleges - and I've been in all but two in my time. But I must say I know less students at Frankston than at other Colleges and that I've come in at a difficult time when my role is changing markedly. I'll be involved in more administrative duties such as money matters, staff appointments etc. which will prevent me from getting to know students as well, but I believe that they are generally fine people. Their attitudes and interests are the same in most Colleges.

It's a terrible thing but I can't help looking back into the past, at my age you tend to do these things. There has been a tremendous improvement in pay so that we can now be classified as professional people - perhaps in other aspects we can't be as yet...

We are very honored to have the Deputy Premier and Minister of
Education here with us right on the eve of an election, and
indeed thrilled to provide the occasion for the first official
appearance of our new Director-General. Dr. Shears has been
in bed for two weeks now with a back injury, and has risen
from that bed to be with us for a brief period this afternoon.

It is customary on such an occasion to say what a joy and pleasure it is to welcome you all. Today I say so with even greater sincerity. It is truly a joy and a pleasure to welcome so many of our interested friends at last in this fine complex of buildings which has been but a dream for so long-

One cannot hope to welcome you all by name, but at this stage I would like to mention some individuals and groups who have joined us in this afternoon's celebration. Such an occasion is a time when one looks confidently to the future, but also, very proudly, to the past.

In 1959, this College began in Struan, the brick house at the entrance, with 10 members of staff and 100 students under the leadership of Mr. Warwick Eunson. For the major part of its 15-year history it has been guided by Mr. George Jenkins, whose vision is evident in the development you see about you today. These two gentlemen, together with Mr. Len Pryor, formerly Director of Teacher Education, are all here this afternoon, and we welcome them most warmly.

We also did our best to contact all past presidents of the Student Representative Council, and quite a number of them have come along, as have our District Inspectors, Principals of local Secondary Schools, Principals of our Primary Training Schools, and the office-bearers of the F.T.C. Association.

Our parliamentary representatives have shown constant interest and support for our activities, when they have visited the campus, or when we have been on deputation to them, and we welcome this afternoon Mr. Phillip Lynch, Mr. Ray Meagher and Mr. Roy Ward.

We are glad, too, to welcome our present Director of Teacher Education, Mr. Lloyd Senior, and other officers of the Teacher Education Division, together with Principals of other primary teachers' colleges in the metropolitan area.

Some of the proudest people here today must surely be the architects, builders, engineers, and P.W.D. officials, who have been responsible for the building. The representatives of Norris and Partners, architects, A. V. Jennings, builders, Coombs - and Graham Anderson & Associates, have worked with us here in very happy association, and we are going to miss them as members of staff.

Looking now to the future, we ask you all for your continuing interest and support for the College, and to seek this interest in the wider community we welcome today some of our leading citizens, heads of other government departments, and presidents of local cultural societies. I hope you will feel as proud of this College in Frankston as we do, that you will come to know us even better, and that we can be of mutual assistance in improving even further the quality of life on this beautiful peninsula.

I welcome you all, together with your husbands, wives and friends.

Now perhaps I should say a few words about the buildings. The main section consists of two four-storey twin towers, planned eventually to be the Student Union and the Resource Centre. For the present, however, some floors have been adapted to lecturing and office accommodation. In addition to these, we have this magnificent theatre and an administrative block. As you leave the theatre, later not now - you will enter the students' common room, and if you walk to your left, diagonally across this, and go up to the main stairway, you will be in the cafeteria where afternoon tea is to be served. The next floor is the staff common room, and the top floor will accommodate the English Department. The further building contains the library and audio-visual centre on the third and fourth floor, with Education and Mathematics on floors 1 and 2. All are open for your inspection, and members of staff will gladly answer questions.

Next year with these additional buildings, we anticipate an enrolment of between 900 and 1,000 students, and the present master plan envisages further multi-storey buildings to allow an enrolment of 2,000. These will be built further along on this lower section of the campus, and then the light timber construction will be removed to allow that area to be re-developed as a student common.

So you see, we can all look to a challenging and exciting time as we move into and use these new facilities which are worthy of the teaching profession, worthy of the work being done here, worthy of the staff and worthy of the students and, we hope, an asset to Frankston. In welcoming you all, I have tried to speak to you briefly of the past, and of the future. I would like to conclude by linking these together, and honoring two of the pioneers: It is with great pleasure that I announce that we intend to name the library in the Resource Centre "The Warwick Eunson Library", and the theatre in which we are sitting "The George Jenkins Theatre".





TENTALLY 4 AND THE REM DESIGNED

 The following information may be helpful:
 - (a) All rooms in the new building are profixed with h. (AL-I, \$2-4, \$6-5 etc). The h will distinguish the rooms in the present new block from future new ones whose rooms will be profixed with B, g etc.
 - (b) AI-I is a room on the first level or floor, A2-3 a room on the second level, and A2-5 a room on the fourth level, there are no locture rooms on the third level.

TIMETABLE 4 AND THE NEW BUILDING

- Students are advised that when Timetable 4 comes into operation, on Thursday 26th April (the day after the Easter Vacation), all lectures in Education, English, Maths, and PPT will be taken in the new building. Some other lectures will be taken there too.


 The only reason why lectures will be taken in the new building before the beginning of Term 2 is because, as from Thursday 26th April, all students will be in college at the same time and all available rooms will be needed.
- 3. Copies of Timetable 4 are displayed on the noticeboard opposite the present common rooms. To ensure a smooth beginning to the working of Timetable 4 students should consult these copies. The following information may be helpful:
 - (a) All rooms in the new building are prefixed with A. (AI=I, A2=4, A4=5 etc). The A will distinguish the rooms in the present new block from future new ones whose rooms will be prefixed with B, C etc.
 - (b) AI-I is a room on the first level or floor, A2-3 a room on the second level, and A4-5 a room on the fourth level. There are no lecture rooms on the third level.
 - (c) The last figure in A1-1, A2-3, and A4-5 denotes a particular room on each of the three levels where there are lecture rooms.
 - (d) Rooms on the first level (AI=I and AI=2) will be used mainly for PPT, rooms on the second level (A2=I, A2=3, A2=8 etc.) mainly for EDU and MAT, and rooms on the fourth level (A4=I, A4=2, A4=7 etc.) mainly for ENG.
 - (e) Staff will not move into their new offices until the beginning of Term 2 when they will occupy offices on the same levels as their lecture rooms: PPT on the first level, EDU and MAT on the second level, and EMG on the fourth level. Some members of the Social Science faculty will occupy offices on the first level.
- 4. Until students become fully aware of the location of the various rooms where they are taking lectures, and how to get to them, it is recommended that they allow themselves ample time for their voyages of discovery. Hope you find your room:
- 5. We hope you will be proud of our new building, and that you will express your pride by the way you care for it.

ALEXANDER BUZO

Subsection II: About the Playwright

Alexander Buzo was born in Sydney in 1944 and educated at Armidale, New South Wales; Geneva, Switzerland and the University of New South Wales, where he graduated with a B.A. in 1965. After working as a waiter, storeman-packer and public servant, he became a professional writer in 1968. His seven plays to date are Norm and Ahmed (written in 1967); Rooted (1968); The Front Room Boys (1969); The Roy Murphy Show (1970); Macquarie (1971); Tom (1972) and Batman's Beachhead (1973). Alexander Buzo lives with his wife and daughter in Melbourne where he is resident dramatist with The Melbourne Theatre Company.

SECTION B.

Director's Statement

Ever since the seven months I spent languishing in the Public Service I have had a dream of producing Alex Buzo's "Front Room Boys" to show some of what modern office life is all about. Here is a play which reveals the inanities, frustrations and boredom of clerical work. More importantly, the play examines the relationship between rulers and those ruled. In this it reflects many situations in our society. I especially believe it relevant to people involved in becoming teachers. The teacher is one of the important authority figures in our society and the children in his class are, to varying degrees, ruled by him.

For those of you who have ever worked in an office, all the characters of the play should be easily recognised.

Parallels may also be drawn by those involved with large educational institutions.

A small group of students have worked extremely hard to make this, the first all-student production, a success. We hope you enjoy "The Front Room Boys" and give your support to future productions.

A dossier of those appearing as the above-mentioned characters in the aforementioned play as they are designated beside the first part of the second part, in order of seniority, follows:

Graeme Midgley

As for most of the cast, this play is an ideal vehicle for Graeme. Although he has had little acting experience, this is of no consequence for he is merely reliving previous experiences having served his apprenticeship as The Post Office Clerk at the P.M.G. Supply Branch. His tasks there ranged from handling Postmen's whistles to stamping and approving S6 forms. After twelve months of boredom, Graeme, with a factual "I've had this", downed pen and applied for a teaching studentship. For the sceptics Graeme reassures us that Prestos really do exist in their multitudes, in every office, in every department of the Public Service throughout the nation.

Bruce West

In his own words, Bruce's acting experience is "very nil" but he was especially motivated to audition for this particular play because he felt that his experience as Search Clerk for the Buildings Branch of the Education Department would stand him in good stead.

During his three months of searching and never being found, he experienced "despair" and "acute boredom". His roamings gave him ample opportunity to observe case studies of the ubiquitous Robbo and his inane ramblings, and as for the play, Bruce's only comment was that it was too real to be funny. Bruce has been previously involved in other College productions as lighting director of Black Comedy and actor in "There's an Elf in My Pocket".

Bill Jeffs

Prior to his enrolment at College, Bill spent six months of 1970 in the Department of Social Services in charge of 350 pension cheques (L - Z category). However, after spending 4 hours of every one of his 180 days down at the local and the rest of the time gleefully destroying the aspirations of pensioners (L - Z category) he decided that there must be something better to do. His lust for excitement was eventually sated when he became a check-out boy in a self-service grocery.

Having been through the mill, Bill reiterates that the characters and events of the play are to be found with monotonous regularity in real life. As Gibbo, he tops off a fine list of credits in College productions, having already starred in Calamity Jane, Black Comedy and Caught in the Act during his three years here.

Angus McArthur

An ex-national service conscript, Angus too has experienced regimentation and bureaucracy. Whilst stationed in Singapore he gained a slanted view of the inner workings of the Army as Property Clerk in the Stores Department opposite the spy base. Honourably discharged as a result of the change in Federal Government, Angus took up teaching and is in his first year at College. He has already appeared in the College production "Caught In The Act" requiring a multiplicity of roles and further displays his untapped acting talent as the disgruntled Jacko.

Malcolm Nicholson

Both Malcolm's acting experience and contact with office life are similarly limited. However, he did at one time hold aspirations of joining the Commonwealth Public Service and did in fact sit for an exam. When this application was rejected Malcolm developed a benign acceptance of the fickleness of the appointment board and this was further emphasized when they later offered him a position in the light of being short-staffed. He refused it and took up a teaching studentship.

Malcolm says he has found his role as Vittorio a rewarding experience and further expresses a kindred empathy for those descendants of Mediterranean parentage trying to forge an identity of their own in their native born land.

Jenni Dickens

Jenni's role as the perennial office tart, Pammy, is a marked contrast to her excellent portrayal of a middle-aged spinster in "A Black Comedy", yet she handles it with equal aplomb. The closest Jenni has come to being a public servant is working in the Slacks Department of a big department store where she studied her bouncing caricature of Pammy in close proximity. She is a third year student and lends a bit of class and a lot of 'oomph' to the production.

Heather Ritchie

Heather has found "The Front Room Boys" a new and rewarding experience yet fits into the role of Sundra well, finding her not atypical of the majority of office stenographers. Being treasurer of the S.R.C. Heather has come to experience some of the bureaucratic nature of large administrative organisations, and has further lent some of her natural acting qualities to her role of the apparently faithful and true Sundra. Unfortunately for the male members of the cast Heather does not fully live her part and is reticent about handing out favours as readily as Sundra. She nevertheless lends a touch of womanliness to balance the male predominance.

Geoff Shaw

Geoff, normally not lacking in eloquence, originally found difficulty in adjusting to the role of Hendo but finally settled into the superior, silent image. This was very much in keeping with his only other acting appearance in 'Our Town' at High School. Having come straight from High School to College he somewhat lacks the experience of some of the more senior members of the cast but has found the calculating, sycophantic Hendo an easy role to envisage. During three years at College the call of the stage had not beckoned him but "The Front Room Boys" has put him through the school of hardknocks and he now finds himself a little more "in the know".

Brian Collins

From the first time he opened his mouth at auditions, Brian stood out as being ideal for the part of Thommo. His total command of the language and the stage further enhanced this automatic choice. A first year student, Brian came straight from High School where he appeared in 'Charlie's Aunt'. He did, however, enjoy a brief interlude as a trainee manager with Myers. Despite being the youngest member of the cast, he displays an age and experience beyond his years and portrays the 'middle man' Thommo with obvious ease.

Slimly built and with a soft, but deliberate voice, he strikes you on first impression 25 down-to-earth type.

This must be an asset for Kevin who regularly lectures on a subject that is very much up in the air . . the UFO

phenomenon.

"We would be myoptic to believe that we are the only intelligence in a universe so vast and so homogenous", Kevin said. He was speaking to a

capacity crowd of students at a lecture sponsored by the Students' Representative Council at Frankston

College.

Behind him slides of photographs of UFOs flashed on a screen.

Kevin explained how all photographs of UFOs are carefully checked experts for signs multiple exposure, montage or any other tampering.

If there was still any doubt following these tests photographs were sent to the Department Astrophysics at the University of Arizona where they were computer tested, said Kevin.

According to Kevin one of

the best photographs in the world of a UFO was shot here in Melbourne, at North Balwyn, by a businessman with a Polaroid color camera.

The craft appeared as a metallic half-sphere. It was calculated mathematically (from the photo) to be 20 to 30 ft.

in diameter.

The phenomenon of 'saucer nests' was also relevant, Kevin claimed. Numerous cases of these had been reported around the world, he said. In every case the nest consisted of a burnt circular area about 30ft, in diameter. Samples of earth taken from the site are usually found to have been sterilised, added Kevin.

Why is there such confusion surrounding the UFO phenomenon? "No government in the world has yet conducted a proper scientific study of UFOs," Kevin said.

"A symposium on UFOs was held by leading scientists and engineers at the United States House of Representatives in July 1968 . . . but the results were never made public. "Maybe the US government is frightened to alarm the public.

"At this point in technology we are sending out exploratory probes to neighboring planets.

"It seems feasible to assume that other extra-terrestrial civilisations are doing the same," concluded Kevin.

Today's trainee teachers will mould the minds of those building a great Australian nation, Education Minister and Deputy Premier Mr. Thompson said last Sunday.

He was speaking at the opening of the \$2.4 million theatre, library and student union complex at Frankston Teachers' College.

The ceremony, held in the new multi-sided theatre, was attended by Frankston mayor Cr Bruce Aitken, local secondary school principals, Members of Parliament, SRC past-presidents and district inspectors.

Mr Thompson said:
"Victoria has the best
trainee teacher record in
Australia. We have more
trainees than any other
State, our entrance
standards are highest,
and lecturer standards
are also high.

"Many teachers' college courses, including those at Frankston are comparable with those offered at our three universities.

"With the opening of these buildings today, Frankston will be one of the top colleges in Australia. One which the whole community can be proud of.

"This college is aesthically 150 per cent better than any other Victorian teacher training college.

"I'm sure full use of all facilities will be made right from the start," said Mr Thompson.

The new buildings have been in use during the past two months. But, only the lecture rooms have been used. Books for the new library are still at the old location.

The cafeteria will be fully operative at the start of the second term, late in May.

The new buildings also include an administration block which has been in use since just after the start of first term.

Mr Thompson spoke briefly on the history of teachers' training colleges in Victoria.

He said the first college had been established where St. Paul's cathedral is now located, in 1855. It lasted four years and closed because many people thought its rules and methods, strict and outdated.

"Over the years the standard of training has altered vastly. Originally the course took a year, it increased to two years and finally three years.

"The three year course has greatly increased the standard of teachers entering schools.

"Great diversity of courses is also being introduced. Special courses including art, theatre, music and physical education will have more emphasis placed on major studies.

"Frankston will come under the State Colleges Bill when it is handed down. This will give the college a much greater measure of autonomy, similar to that of universities and technical institutes.

"A college advisory body will be able to grant diplomas and degrees and some colleges may even gain university status in a few years."

Mr Thompson said training colleges would have to cater for many more teachers before 1975 when it was expected that enrolments would double present numbers.

He said the rapid increase of teachers was needed to cater for the boom in primary school numbers.

The new Director General of Education, Dr L. W. Shears, invited Mr Thompson to unveil the plaque commemorating the complex opening.

Dr Shears took over from Mr F. Brooks last Saturday and the complex opening was his first appointment.

He said Frankston Teachers' College had made a magnificent contribution to schools in south-east Melbourne, the peninsula and Gippsland.

"The college could develop into a 30-acre complex with between 2000 and 3000 students in future years.

"The size of the site is not as important as what has been done with the resources present.

Student Representative Council president Mr John Anthony said the college had an aspect of tertiary education which many other universities and advanced education institutes lacked.

"Because of our relatively large size, there is a great deal of student/staff and student interaction.

"I hope these new buildings and improved facilities will not lessen this aspect of college life but will in fact help promote that life.

"I also hope that during the expansion of the college and the increase in the numbers of students attending, we will not lost sight of the individual.

"As prospective teachers it is our duty to deal with individual identities not just a mass of faces.

"College life should foster this attitude," he said.

CANBERRA. — The Australian Commission on Advanced Education has recommended that more than \$206 million should be spent on teacher training in the next 21/2 years.

In a report to the Federal Government, a special com-mittee of the ACAE said that under present arrange-ments nearly \$84 million of this should be provided by

But under the Federal Government's recent offer to the States, the Commonwealth will provide all the finance for teacher educa-tion after January 1.

The report recommends that Victoria's funds for teacher training should be

teacher training should be more than \$71 million.
Of this, \$19.5 million should be spent on capital development in Victoria in the period July, 1973, to December, 1975, and \$51.8 million on recurrent costs.

The \$19.5 million would finance major development and extension works in country and metropolitan areas, it was stated in MELROURNE last night. MELBOURNE last night.
