New Business Degree at Frankston Campus

A new Business course has been accredited at Chisholm Institute of Technology's Frankston campus. The Bachelor of Business (Business Administration) will commence exclusively at Frankston in 1988 in Chisholm's David Syme Business School.

The first intake of the course will be about 70 full-time and 30 part-time students. Evening classes will be held to accommodate the part-timers.

Mr Dennis Taylor is a Principal Lecturer of the David Syme Business School and is responsible for the School's course development at Frankston. He is pleased the course has been accredited.

He said, 'This new course brings withit a much wider range of specialisation options to the Bachelor of Business course at Frankston. It has been developed for those completing Year 12 or who have appropriate work experience, and with the ambition to pursue a professional or executive career in such fields as personnel, marketing, public relations, banking and finance, agribusiness or supply/distribution management.'

The three-year course comprises studies for a sub-major grouping of subjects in human resource (often known as personnel) management, together with studies in operations management, financial management, marketing management, information management and entrepreneurship.

Students also choose a vocational specialisation to complete a major or sub-major in marketing/public relations, banking and finance, agribusiness, logistics management or office administration.

Employment opportunities for graduates of the course are

promising. They extend in the directions of general and personnel administration, as applied in the functional area of specialisation studied in the course.

Application forms for parttime and mature-aged students are now available from Chisholm's Frankston campus, by telephoning 784 4316. Year 12 graduates in 1987 must apply through VTAC.

Phillip Law nominated for BHP Excellence Award

Famed Australian explorer of the Antarctic, Dr Phillip Law, after whom the B Block Building at Caulfield campus is named, has been nominated for a BHP Award for the Pursuit of Excellence.

Dr Law is currently preparing his diaries and papers for the National Library in Canberra. Between 1943 and 1966, he led 11 Australian National Antarctic Research Expeditions, and he charted thousands of kilometres of its coast. Following an article in *The Australian* recently, in which he mentioned his 22 diaries and his need for a secretary to help him prepare them, he was inundated with offers of help.

Dr Law was nominated by his friends, who were unable to determine which category he fitted into. They left that task to the judging panel.

Retail Marketing celebrates its 10th Anniversary at Chisholm

The Marketing Department in the David Syme Business School at Chisholm recently celebrated its tenth anniversary of retail marketing education.

Keynote speaker at the anniversary night was Mr Bevan Bradbury, who retired this year as the Chairman of Coles Myer, and is one of the most prominent

businessmen in the country. He played a major part in the growth of Coles over the past fifteen years, leading up to the takeover of Myer and the forging of these two famous retail giants into one of the largest retail companies in the world.

The first course, in retail management, was opened in 1977 as a subject in the Bachelor of

Business Marketing. Two years later, the School introduced an Associate Diploma in Retail Management—the first tertiary retail qualification in Australia. The following year, in 1980, a Retail Management Development Program was introduced for retail managers, along with a course for retail buyers.

The Department has remained at the forefront of retail education ever since, and has had seven Visiting Retail Executives who have imparted their experience to students and staff. Currently, Mr Graham Goldie, Group General Manager (Stores) of Myer Stores is the Visiting Retail Executive.

New Centre aims at better understanding of streams and rivers in Australia

The Australian Water Research Advisory Council (AWRAC) has pledged \$450,000 over the next three years to enable Chisholm, together with Monash University, to establish a Centre for Stream Ecology.

It is expected that the Museum of Victoria will also be closely linked to the new centre. The Centre is one of 12 that AWRAC has established, and the only one at a CAE.

Dr Barry Hart, present Head of the Department of Chemistry and Biology, and Director of the Water Studies Centre at Chisholm, will be Director of the new Centre. It will initially draw on the expertise of 14 scientific staff, three technical staff and will have one administrative secretary.

Learning how to Manage Rivers and Streams

The Centre will conduct research designed to improve our understanding of the ecology of the streams and rivers of Australia, and of the effects of water catchment and stream disturbances on their flora and fauna. This will ensure that the systems are managed better and with care for the environment.

The need for this research has grown from a concern that many of our streams have been seriously damaged by changing land-use, the discharge of wastes, and sand extraction from streams. This has affected the stream organisms, both plant and animal, and any moves to improve their state will depend upon a fuller knowledge of their inter-relationships.

The Centre will undertake fundamental and applied research under the direction of Dr Hart and Dr Ian Campbell of Chisholm, Dr Sam Lake of Monash, and Dr Richard Marchant of the Museum of Victoria. This core research will concentrate on two main programs, one aimed at outlining the structure, functioning and response to disturbances of stream communities, and the other at the role of catchment land in the ecology of streams.

In addition, it will provide post-graduate educational opportunities within the existing Graduate Diploma in Water Science and the Masters and PhD programs at both Chisholm and Monash. A number of seminars, short courses and conferences will be held to enable information to be shared. The Centre will also undertake specialist consulting work.


Chisholm's 1987 Open Day was a great success, despite wet weather and cold winds.

It is competing against such corporate giants as Ford and General Motors, but Team Leader, Paul Wellington, of the Mechanical Engineering Department believes it is competitive.

The Director thanked the 300















Nursing students demonstrated the skills they are learning.





Council News

General Staff Representative on Council since June 1984, Paul Rodan, has joined the Humanities Department in the School of Social and Behavioural Studies as a lecturer, and has resigned from the Council as a result. Alison Hall, from the Physics Department in Digital Technology has been elected to fill the vacancy.

Ms Hall defeated Mark Spatz of Community Services at Frankston with 115 votes to 96. A further six votes were invalid. She serves until the term of her predecessor, runs out in March 1988. Ms Hall thanked all General Staff for her election and said that she looked forward to representing them on Council. She can be contacted on extension 2354.

Ms Judy Arndt was also reappointed to the Council until 1990. Council member Mr Jack Campbell was re-appointed Mayor of Caulfield for a second term, and was congratulated by the Chairman, Dr Lionel Ward.

In other developments on Council, the Minister for Education, Mr Ian Cathie, was assured by Council that the relationship between Seedcap Pty Ltd and Chisholm was a proper one, and those with interests in the company declared them. The company has been set up by Dr Denis Kiellerup, of the Centre for the Development of Entrepreneurs, with several other people, to fund new ideas, and it is wholly independent.

The issue of the exporting of education through the introduction of full fee-paying overseas students into Chisholm was again raised at the August meeting with a discussion paper presented by Mr Arthur Crook, Academic Staff representative on Council. It will be considered along with a proposal by the Director at the September meeting.

Council also received a paper by the Director reporting on the negotiations between the College Councils Association of Victoria and the Council of Academic Staff Associations on matters of tenure, contract staff and redundancy. The Council supported the ratification of a 25% untenured employment figure. A stop work meeting was held by CASA members in all Victorian Colleges on Wednesday 19 August in

support of their claims, with the backing of the Academic Staff Association of Chisholm.

The Buildings and Property Committee reported that the Student Union/Technology Tower was proceeding according to schedule and that the Teaching and Nursing Buildings at Frankston were also progressing well. A number of enquiries regarding tenancy in the Technology Tower have been received.

PEOPLE Sexual harassment illegal

Equal Opportunity Commissioner explains the problems in the workplace

Chisholm was recently visited by the Acting Commissioner, Dr Ian Siggins, to follow up a visit by former Commissioner, Fay Marles, last year. He addressed senior academic and general staff on the topic of sexual harassment.

He outlined the nature of the problem and commented on the role senior staff could take in promoting an environment in which sexual harassment is seen as unacceptable behaviour. Sexual harassment is a form of sex discrimination, and is illegal under the state and federal anti-discriminations Acts. Dr Siggins' office receives about 1500–2000 enquiries on this matter each year. Between 70 and 100 of these develop into formal complaints.

Dr Siggins observed that sexual harassment is not very "sexy" and it has little

to do with genuine expressions of It can lead to affection. absenteeism, lack of ambition and a high rate of resignations. He commented that the "classic" forms-the wolf whistle, cat calling, graffiti, cheesecake postersare male to male displays, and that controlling this sort of behaviour is the direct responsibility of line management and department heads. Employers have a legal obligation to create a workplace free of this harassment.

Chisholm, in common with many other employers, has a commitment to creating an employment and educational environment free from sexual harassment. The Director, Dr Geoff Vaughan, recently ratified nominations for Sexual Harassment Conciliators on both campuses. They are: Caulfield: John Milburn, Counsellor (extn. 2500), Sue Newman, Counselling Coordinator (extn. 2500), and Eileen Wilson, Assistant Staff Officer (extn. 2318); Frankston: Cath Collins, Campus Nurse (extn.
